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## 1. Introduction

### 1.1. CIPAD Overview

The **Community Initiative for Partnership and Development (CIPAD)** is a South Sudanese national non-governmental organization with a vision of shaping a society that is fair, resilient, developed, peaceful, and self-reliant. CIPAD is committed to advancing relief and sustainable development through the promotion of partnerships, implementation, and empowerment of community-led initiatives. With a mission focused on fairness, resilience, peaceful coexistence, self-reliance, and enhanced well-being, CIPAD works to foster a supportive environment for all members of society, especially the most vulnerable.

In South Sudan, communities face numerous challenges including ongoing conflict, displacement, human rights violations, and environmental degradation. This protection policy is developed to address these risks and vulnerabilities through a framework that safeguards human rights, enhances dignity, and ensures that all people, especially vulnerable groups, are treated with respect and fairness.

CIPAD recognizes the need for a strong protection policy to guide its operations and ensure that the initiatives it supports do not cause harm but rather contribute to the well-being of all stakeholders. This policy outlines key principles and mechanisms to prevent harm and enhance protection within all its programs and interventions.

## 1.2. Forward

As the Executive Director of Community Initiative for Partnership and Development (CIPAD), I am honored to present our Protection Policy, a cornerstone of our commitment to safeguarding the rights and well-being of the communities we serve. ## 2. Core Protection Principles

CIPAD’s protection policy is grounded in core protection principles, including:

1. **Non-discrimination:** Every individual, regardless of gender, ethnicity, religion, or socioeconomic status, is entitled to equal protection under this policy. CIPAD ensures that all its programs are inclusive and designed to benefit all members of the community without discrimination.
2. **Dignity:** Protection efforts must be driven by the fundamental principle of preserving human dignity. All individuals are entitled to be treated with respect, and their rights must be upheld in all activities and interventions.
3. **Respect for Human Rights:** CIPAD commits to adhering to international human rights standards. Protection efforts should support the promotion of rights such as freedom of expression, safety, and equal access to services.
4. **Do No Harm:** This principle ensures that all CIPAD activities must be designed and executed in a way that avoids exacerbating vulnerabilities or creating new protection risks. Staff will be trained to understand and mitigate any unintentional harm that may result from interventions.

These core principles guide the way CIPAD engages with beneficiaries, partners, and the community at large, ensuring that protection is central to all its operations.

## 3. Scope and Applicability

This Protection Policy is integral to ensuring the safety and well-being of all individuals and communities involved with CIPAD. It applies universally to all stakeholders, including staff members, volunteers, consultants, beneficiaries, partners, and donors. The policy’s reach encompasses the full spectrum of CIPAD’s operations, from its humanitarian interventions to development programs, advocacy efforts, and capacity-building initiatives. It is designed to safeguard the rights and dignity of individuals throughout all phases of engagement, whether in emergency settings, long-term development programs, or advocacy campaigns.

The policy extends across all levels of intervention, ensuring that protection principles are embedded into every aspect of CIPAD’s work. This includes community-based initiatives that directly impact individuals and vulnerable groups, as well as broader institutional and governmental engagements where CIPAD collaborates with national and international partners. Regardless of the programmatic scope or geographic location, the protection policy is designed to guide all activities, ensuring that all stakeholders are held to the same high standards of safety, dignity, and respect.

This policy also governs CIPAD’s relationships with external partners and collaborators, reinforcing the commitment to protection at every level of the partnership. All entities engaged with CIPAD—whether through project implementation, funding, or advocacy efforts—must adhere to the principles and guidelines set forth in this document. This guarantees a unified, coordinated approach to protection, ensuring that protection standards are consistently upheld, regardless of the nature of the work or the geographical context.

At the core of this policy is the principle that every individual involved with CIPAD, from its internal staff to its external partners and the beneficiaries it serves, has the right to a safe and secure environment. All personnel, regardless of their role or function, are required to fully adhere to the protection principles and the operational guidelines outlined in this policy. This includes the responsibility to prevent harm, respect the dignity of individuals, and respond promptly and effectively to any protection concerns that may arise.

By embedding these principles into all aspects of its operations, CIPAD ensures that protection is not an isolated or secondary consideration but is instead an integral component of all activities. This comprehensive approach is essential in maintaining the trust of stakeholders, upholding the rights of vulnerable groups, and ensuring the long-term success and integrity of CIPAD's programs. Ultimately, this policy serves as a framework for safeguarding the well-being of all individuals impacted by CIPAD's work, ensuring that protection remains at the forefront of all organizational activities and partnerships.

#### 4. Definitions

To ensure clarity and consistency in the application of this policy, the following key terms are defined within the context of CIPAD's work. These definitions are critical for understanding the specific protection concerns that CIPAD seeks to address and will guide the policy's implementation.

**Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (SEA):** Sexual exploitation and abuse refer to any actual or attempted abuse of power and trust by CIPAD personnel, partners, or affiliates, where sexual advances, exploitation, or coercion are involved. This includes, but is not limited to, situations where personnel or partners seek sexual favors or impose sexual acts in exchange for services, aid, or other benefits. SEA also includes any behavior that may undermine the dignity and rights of individuals by abusing their vulnerabilities in a sexual context.

**Child Protection:** Child protection encompasses all efforts and strategies designed to prevent, respond to, and address any form of violence, abuse, exploitation, or neglect directed at children. This includes physical, emotional, and sexual abuse, as well as exploitation, trafficking, and neglect. The primary focus of child protection is to ensure that children's rights are upheld and that they are provided with safe and nurturing environments free from harm. It also involves promoting the participation of children in decisions affecting their well-being, while ensuring that their safety and security are always prioritized.

**Gender-based Violence (GBV):** Gender-based violence refers to any harmful act that is perpetrated against an individual based on their gender. This includes physical, sexual, and psychological violence that disproportionately affects women, girls, and gender minorities, though it can affect individuals of any gender. GBV can take many forms, such as intimate partner violence, sexual assault, trafficking, and harmful traditional practices, among others. It

reflects systemic gender inequalities and is rooted in societal norms that reinforce gender discrimination, making it an issue that requires targeted interventions aimed at both prevention and response.

**Safeguarding:** Safeguarding refers to the set of measures and actions taken to protect individuals, especially the most vulnerable, from harm, abuse, exploitation, and neglect within the context of any program, service, or initiative. It includes ensuring that all personnel are trained and equipped to uphold safety standards and take immediate action if harm or risk is identified. Safeguarding is a broad framework that addresses protection concerns in all forms of CIPAD's work, including humanitarian assistance, development programs, and advocacy initiatives.

**Protection from Harassment:** Protection from harassment includes preventing and responding to any form of unwanted behavior that creates a hostile, intimidating, or threatening environment for individuals engaged with CIPAD. Harassment can take many forms, including physical, verbal, or psychological abuse, and often involves power imbalances. It can affect individuals in the workplace, as well as in other settings where CIPAD operates, including community spaces. Harassment, in any form, undermines individuals' safety and well-being and is prohibited under this policy.

**Exploitation:** Exploitation refers to any situation where an individual or group takes unfair advantage of the vulnerability of others, often for personal gain. Within the context of CIPAD's work, exploitation can occur when people are coerced or manipulated into providing services, goods, or labor without appropriate compensation, or under threat or duress. This includes, but is not limited to, financial exploitation, labor exploitation, and sexual exploitation, where the affected individuals are denied their rights and basic human dignity.

**Discrimination:** Discrimination involves unfair or unequal treatment of individuals or groups based on characteristics such as gender, age, ethnicity, disability, sexual orientation, religion, or other protected categories. Discrimination leads to exclusion, marginalization, and harm to individuals or groups. The protection policy commits to addressing and preventing any form of discrimination, ensuring that all stakeholders are treated with respect and dignity, and that all individuals have equal access to opportunities, services, and protection.

**Accountability:** Accountability within the context of this policy refers to the obligation of CIPAD personnel, partners, and affiliates to be answerable for their actions or inactions in relation to protection issues. This includes taking responsibility for maintaining the highest standards of protection, ensuring transparency in the implementation of policies, and being subject to appropriate measures in cases of misconduct. Accountability ensures that those who are responsible for harm or violations are held to account, and that victims receive appropriate remedies.

**Access to Justice:** Access to justice refers to ensuring that all individuals have the right to seek legal redress and protection when their rights have been violated. This includes the ability to report incidents of abuse, exploitation, or violence, and to have those incidents addressed fairly and impartially. CIPAD ensures that beneficiaries and all affected persons have clear channels

for reporting and seeking justice, and that these mechanisms are safe, confidential, and easily accessible.

These definitions form the core understanding of the protection concerns that CIPAD aims to address and provide a clear framework for the implementation of this policy. Ensuring that all personnel, partners, and stakeholders are familiar with and understand these terms is essential for maintaining a consistent approach to protection and safeguarding in all aspects of CIPAD's work.

## 5. Legal and Institutional Framework

CIPAD is committed to safeguarding the rights and dignity of individuals and communities it serves, ensuring that protection practices are aligned with both international human rights standards and the national legal framework in South Sudan. To achieve this, CIPAD adheres to a comprehensive set of international conventions, regional treaties, national laws, and internal policies that guide its protection practices. This section explores the key legal and institutional frameworks that form the foundation of CIPAD's protection policy.

### 5.1. International Legal Framework

**The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC):** The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC), adopted in 1989, is the most widely ratified human rights treaty in history. This convention establishes the rights of children across all aspects of life, including education, healthcare, protection from exploitation, and access to justice. As a key international instrument, the CRC emphasizes the duty of governments and organizations like CIPAD to ensure that children's best interests are always a primary consideration in any actions affecting them. CIPAD aligns its child protection measures with the CRC's principles to prevent and respond to all forms of abuse, neglect, and exploitation of children. This commitment includes taking preventive actions to protect children within its programs and ensuring that children have access to safe spaces where their rights are upheld.

**The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR):** Adopted by the United Nations in 1948, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) serves as the cornerstone of international human rights law. It affirms the inherent dignity and equal and inalienable rights of all people, without discrimination. The UDHR enshrines the right to life, liberty, and security of person, as well as protection from torture, cruelty, or degrading treatment. CIPAD's protection policy aligns with the principles of the UDHR by ensuring that its programming, personnel behavior, and interactions with beneficiaries uphold the dignity and rights of individuals in every context. The policy also aims to prevent any violations of human rights and to provide avenues for accountability where rights have been compromised.

**The African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights (ACHPR):** The African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights, adopted in 1981 by the Organization of African Unity (now the

African Union), is a regional human rights instrument that protects both individual and collective rights. It affirms the right to dignity, freedom, and equality, and includes specific provisions related to the protection of vulnerable groups, including children, women, and ethnic minorities. The ACHPR also obligates member states to protect individuals from violations of their rights, including issues of gender-based violence, discrimination, and exploitation. In its operations within South Sudan and the wider African region, CIPAD draws on the ACHPR to inform its policies related to safeguarding, child protection, and the prevention of gender-based violence, ensuring that these regional protections are upheld.

## 5.2. National Legal Framework: The South Sudan Transitional Constitution of 2011

The **South Sudan Transitional Constitution of 2011** provides the legal basis for the protection of human rights in South Sudan, recognizing the importance of individual freedoms, justice, and equality. The Constitution guarantees fundamental rights, including the right to life, personal security, and protection from abuse, exploitation, and trafficking. It also enshrines specific protections for children and women, as well as for individuals who are vulnerable due to their ethnic, social, or economic status.

CIPAD's protection policy is grounded in the constitutional rights outlined in South Sudan's Transitional Constitution, ensuring that all activities are conducted in accordance with national legal standards. This includes ensuring that programs respect the rights of children, prohibit gender-based violence, and provide appropriate avenues for redress in cases of human rights violations. In the context of South Sudan, where humanitarian challenges are significant, CIPAD ensures that its interventions are legally compliant with both the constitution and applicable national laws, reinforcing the importance of justice, dignity, and protection in all aspects of its work.

## 5.3. CIPAD's Internal Policies and Guidelines

In addition to adhering to international and national frameworks, CIPAD has developed its own internal policies to complement these legal protections and ensure that all activities are conducted ethically and in a manner consistent with the organization's values. These internal policies are designed to provide clear guidance for staff, volunteers, and partners on how to uphold the protection of beneficiaries and maintain a safe working environment.

**Staff Conduct and Code of Ethics:** CIPAD has established a strict **Code of Conduct** for its staff, which sets out the expected standards of behavior in all professional interactions, both within the organization and with external stakeholders. This code emphasizes the importance of respect for human rights, ethical behavior, and accountability in every aspect of CIPAD's work. The Code of Conduct includes provisions to prevent sexual exploitation, abuse, and harassment, outlining specific consequences for violations of these standards. Staff are also regularly trained on safeguarding practices, ensuring they understand their responsibilities in protecting vulnerable individuals.

**Child Protection Policy:** CIPAD has developed a comprehensive **Child Protection Policy** that is informed by best practices in the humanitarian field. This policy aims to prevent and respond

to any risks of harm to children that may arise during program implementation. The policy includes specific guidelines on safe recruitment practices, including background checks for staff and volunteers working with children, as well as protocols for reporting suspected child abuse or exploitation. CIPAD ensures that its programs are designed with the best interests of children in mind, providing safe spaces for learning, recreation, and access to services, while also safeguarding children from any form of exploitation or abuse.

**Gender Sensitivity Guidelines:** CIPAD's **Gender Sensitivity Guidelines** are designed to address and prevent gender-based violence and discrimination in all its programs. The organization recognizes the disproportionate impact of violence on women and girls, particularly in conflict settings, and has developed specific interventions to address these challenges. This includes providing access to psychosocial support, safe spaces, and legal aid for survivors of gender-based violence, as well as promoting gender equality in program design and implementation.

#### 5.4. Implementation and Accountability

CIPAD's adherence to these legal frameworks is reinforced by robust **accountability mechanisms**. The organization has established clear reporting and monitoring systems to ensure that protection standards are met and that any violations are addressed swiftly. These mechanisms include confidential reporting channels for beneficiaries, regular audits, and assessments of protection practices, as well as disciplinary procedures for staff who breach the policy. CIPAD is committed to continuous improvement, learning from its experiences and ensuring that its protection practices remain effective, lawful, and ethical.

### 6. Protection Risks and Vulnerabilities

South Sudan has faced protracted conflicts, displacement, and humanitarian crises, creating significant protection risks for its populations. These risks are exacerbated by the political and economic instability in the country. Specific protection challenges in South Sudan include:

1. **Conflict-Related Violence:** Ongoing armed conflict has resulted in widespread violence, including attacks on civilians, sexual violence, and forced recruitment of children into armed groups. Many families live in constant fear of violence, with limited access to justice and accountability.
2. **Displacement:** Over 2 million people are internally displaced, with another 2.2 million living as refugees in neighboring countries. Displacement often exposes individuals to heightened risks of violence, exploitation, and lack of access to basic services.
3. **Vulnerable Populations:** Women, children, the elderly, and persons with disabilities are disproportionately affected by protection risks. Women and girls face high rates of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), while children are at risk of recruitment by armed groups, trafficking, and forced labor.

4. **Lack of Access to Legal Protections:** Many displaced persons and marginalized communities in South Sudan have limited access to legal recourse or services that could provide protection or remedy for violations.
5. **Gender-Based Violence (GBV):** South Sudan continues to experience high rates of GBV, with armed conflict exacerbating these risks. Women and girls in conflict zones face sexual violence, domestic abuse, and exploitation.
6. **Child Protection:** Children in South Sudan face a variety of protection risks, including recruitment into armed forces, exploitation, abuse, and limited access to education. The lack of child protection systems further magnifies these risks.

CIPAD will focus its protection efforts on addressing these risks through community-led initiatives and strategic partnerships, ensuring the safety and well-being of vulnerable individuals and communities.

## 7. Protection Strategies

CIPAD's approach to addressing protection risks involves the implementation of comprehensive and integrated protection strategies across all programming areas. These strategies are based on the identification of specific risks and vulnerabilities within the South Sudanese context. Key protection strategies include:

1. **Community-Based Protection Initiatives:** Empowering local communities to identify and address protection risks is essential to the success of CIPAD's protection programming. Community protection committees, led by local leaders and representatives, will be formed to actively engage in risk assessment, mitigation, and response efforts.
2. **Advocacy and Awareness:** Promoting awareness about human rights, GBV, and child protection through public education campaigns will be integral to the protection efforts. CIPAD will work with local partners to educate both communities and authorities on the importance of protection and how to prevent harm.
3. **Integrated Protection in Program Design:** Protection will be a cross-cutting issue within all of CIPAD's programming, including health, education, and livelihoods. Protection risks will be considered at the program design stage, and activities will be tailored to mitigate identified vulnerabilities.
4. **Safe Spaces and Services for Survivors:** Establishing safe spaces for women, children, and other vulnerable groups, along with providing psychological support and essential services such as medical care, legal aid, and shelter for survivors of violence.
5. **Referral Pathways:** Establishing clear referral pathways for survivors of violence, exploitation, and abuse, ensuring they have access to the support they need from relevant service providers.
6. **Building Local Capacity:** Strengthening the capacity of local organizations and authorities to respond to protection issues is a long-term strategy that will ensure sustainability and local ownership of protection efforts.
7. **Gender-Responsive Programming:** Ensuring that all programs are gender-sensitive and designed to address the unique needs of women, girls, and other gender minorities. Special attention will be given to preventing SGBV and providing services for survivors.

These strategies will be reviewed regularly to adapt to the evolving protection situation in South Sudan.

## 8. CIPAD's Protection Framework

CIPAD will establish a clear and functional protection framework that outlines the roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders within the organization to ensure the effective implementation of this policy. Key components of the protection framework include:

1. **Protection Officers:** Designating trained protection officers within CIPAD to oversee the implementation of the policy, conduct regular assessments, and provide guidance to program teams.
2. **Community Focal Points:** Identifying and training community-based protection focal points to liaise with vulnerable groups, report protection concerns, and ensure local involvement in decision-making processes.
3. **Organizational Leadership:** CIPAD's leadership will be responsible for promoting a culture of protection within the organization, allocating necessary resources, and ensuring that all activities are aligned with the protection policy.
4. **Staff Training:** Regular training and capacity-building for all CIPAD staff, volunteers, and partners to ensure they understand and can effectively implement the protection policy. This will include training on safeguarding, human rights, and conflict-sensitive programming.
5. **Collaboration with Local Authorities:** Engaging with local authorities to build their capacity to protect vulnerable populations and create an enabling environment for the implementation of protection efforts.
6. **Coordination with Other Humanitarian Actors:** Working with other humanitarian organizations, UN agencies, and civil society groups to share information, coordinate responses, and ensure the delivery of comprehensive protection services.

## 9. Standards and Accountability Mechanisms

To ensure the effectiveness and integrity of its protection activities, CIPAD is committed to adhering to internationally recognized standards and implementing robust accountability mechanisms. These frameworks are designed to ensure that protection practices are not only effective but also transparent, accessible, and responsive to the needs of the communities we serve. By maintaining high standards and upholding accountability, CIPAD seeks to safeguard the rights and well-being of vulnerable individuals while continuously improving its operations.

**Protection Standards:** CIPAD will adhere to internationally recognized protection standards to guide the design, implementation, and monitoring of all programs. These standards include the Sphere Standards, the Inter-Agency Standing Committee (IASC) Guidelines on Protection, and the UNHCR's Protection Standards. These frameworks offer clear, evidence-based guidance on protection best practices in humanitarian contexts, particularly in relation to the prevention of harm, the protection of children and women, and the safeguarding of vulnerable populations. By aligning its programs with these established standards, CIPAD ensures that protection is integrated into every phase of program delivery, from needs assessment to response and recovery.

**Monitoring and Evaluation:** Continuous **monitoring and evaluation (M&E)** are integral to ensuring the effectiveness of CIPAD’s protection activities. Regular field visits, assessments, and real-time feedback mechanisms will enable CIPAD to track the progress of its protection strategies, identify emerging risks, and adapt interventions to meet evolving needs. By employing participatory M&E approaches, CIPAD will engage beneficiaries in the assessment process, allowing them to provide valuable input on the relevance and impact of protection interventions. Feedback gathered through these mechanisms will be used to refine and improve future programs, ensuring that CIPAD’s protection efforts remain responsive and effective.

**Complaints and Feedback Mechanisms:** CIPAD will establish accessible and confidential complaints mechanisms for beneficiaries, partners, and staff to report concerns or violations related to protection. These mechanisms will be designed to ensure that all individuals, regardless of location or background, can safely report any issues related to exploitation, abuse, or mistreatment. CIPAD will provide multiple avenues for reporting, including in-person, via phone, and through secure online platforms, ensuring that these systems are culturally sensitive and tailored to the local context. The goal is to create a safe environment where all individuals can voice their concerns without fear of retaliation, and where reports are addressed in a timely and transparent manner.

**External Audits and Evaluations:** To maintain the highest levels of transparency and accountability, CIPAD will conduct regular external audits and evaluations of its protection activities. These independent assessments will evaluate CIPAD’s compliance with the protection policy, the effectiveness of its protection strategies, and the overall impact on the community. External audits will examine program operations, staff conduct, and adherence to protection standards, identifying areas for improvement. Findings from these evaluations will inform program design and implementation, ensuring that CIPAD remains accountable to both its beneficiaries and donors, and continuously improves the quality and impact of its protection efforts.

By implementing rigorous protection standards, monitoring and evaluation processes, accessible complaints mechanisms, and regular external audits, CIPAD ensures that its protection activities are not only compliant with international and national regulations but are also responsive to the needs of the communities it serves. These accountability mechanisms will help maintain the integrity of CIPAD’s protection efforts and foster trust among beneficiaries, staff, partners, and stakeholders, ensuring that all individuals are treated with dignity, respect, and care.

## **10. Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA)**

CIPAD is committed to preventing sexual exploitation and abuse (SEA) in all of its operations. To this end, CIPAD will implement the following:

1. **Code of Conduct and PSEA Policy:** All staff, volunteers, and partners will be required to sign and adhere to a code of conduct that outlines expectations regarding behavior, including the prohibition of sexual exploitation and abuse.

2. **Awareness and Training:** Regular training will be provided to staff, volunteers, and community members to raise awareness about SEA and to build their capacity to report and respond to incidents.
3. **Reporting Mechanisms:** CIPAD will establish confidential, safe, and accessible reporting channels for survivors of SEA. These channels will be available to all affected individuals, regardless of their location or status.
4. **Monitoring and Enforcement:** Strict monitoring mechanisms will be put in place to identify and address any SEA incidents. Any staff or partner found to have violated the policy will face disciplinary actions, including termination of contracts and legal action if necessary.

**Community Engagement:** CIPAD will work closely with communities to raise awareness about SEA risks, inform them of their rights, and encourage community members to participate in efforts to prevent and respond to SEA.

## 11. Risk and Safeguarding Policies

CIPAD is committed to the protection and safeguarding of children, vulnerable adults, and marginalized groups across all its programs and activities. Regular monitoring and evaluation will be conducted to assess the effectiveness of our protection measures and to ensure compliance with national and international safeguarding standards. Feedback from stakeholders, including beneficiaries, staff, and local partners, will be regularly incorporated into policy updates and program design to address emerging risks and challenges in safeguarding.

CIPAD's Risk and Safeguarding Policy is a commitment to creating and maintaining a safe and protective environment for all individuals, particularly the most vulnerable groups we serve. Our policies, procedures, and practices will ensure that safeguarding is embedded in all aspects of our work. We are committed to preventing harm, responding swiftly when issues arise, and continuously improving our efforts to protect the rights and dignity of every person we serve.

## 12. Emergency Protection Protocol

In the face of humanitarian crises, CIPAD is committed to responding swiftly and effectively to the protection needs of affected populations. Whether these crises are due to natural disasters, conflict, displacement, or other emergencies, our Emergency Protection Protocol ensures that vulnerable groups are safeguarded and receive the support they need in a timely and coordinated manner. Our approach is rooted in human dignity and is designed to mitigate risks and prevent harm to affected communities. The following outlines the key components of CIPAD's Emergency Protection Protocol.

To uphold this commitment, we will establish a clear and transparent process for reporting and managing protection incidents, ensuring that concerns are addressed swiftly, effectively, and confidentially. The following outlines the key components of CIPAD's Protection Incident Reporting system.

**Incident Reporting System:** CIPAD will implement a confidential, accessible, and effective system for reporting protection incidents. If the investigation confirms a protection violation, appropriate actions will be taken, which could include legal or disciplinary measures, depending on the severity of the incident.

Accountability and Documentation: All incidents and their investigations will be documented comprehensively, ensuring that there is a clear record of actions taken. Documentation will be handled confidentially and securely to prevent unauthorized access. CIPAD will ensure that all incidents are closed with a satisfactory resolution or follow-up plan.

**Feedback and Support:** CIPAD is committed to ensuring that individuals who report protection incidents receive appropriate feedback and that survivors of protection violations receive necessary support and assistance. The following measures will be put in place:

**Feedback to the Reporter:** Individuals who report incidents will receive regular updates on the status of the investigation and the actions being taken. CIPAD will ensure transparency and clear communication with the reporter, while maintaining the confidentiality of all involved parties.

**Survivor-Centered Approach:** CIPAD will adopt a survivor-centered approach in responding to protection incidents. ## **16. Resource Mobilization**

Partnering with other NGOs will enhance our collective impact, sharing resources and expertise to address the protection needs of vulnerable communities.

**Private Sector Engagement and Corporate Sponsorships:** CIPAD will engage with the private sector to secure corporate sponsorships and partnerships, raising funds through CSR initiatives and corporate donations. This will include providing training on fundraising strategies, donor engagement, and reporting.

**Endowment Funds and Sustainable Income Models:** Where possible, CIPAD will explore the creation of endowment funds or other sustainable income models that can provide long-term, reliable funding for protection activities, enabling continued support for vulnerable populations even in the absence of emergency donor funding.

CIPAD's resource mobilization strategy is integral to the successful implementation and long-term sustainability of our protection activities. By securing diverse funding from donor grants, partnerships, private sector sponsorships, and fundraising initiatives, CIPAD will ensure that it can continue to address critical protection needs and respond effectively to emerging risks. Our commitment to aligning resource mobilization with humanitarian priorities and ensuring sustainability will allow us to maintain high-quality, impactful protection programs over time.

## **17. Implementation and Capacity Building**

To ensure the effective implementation and long-term sustainability of its protection policies, CIPAD is committed to continuously building the capacity of its staff, partners, and systems. A well-trained workforce, strong partnerships, and robust monitoring mechanisms are critical to the successful execution of protection programs that address the needs of vulnerable populations. The following outlines CIPAD's approach to capacity building for the successful implementation of our protection policy.

**Staff Training:** CIPAD understands that well-equipped staff are fundamental to the success of protection activities. Regular, targeted training will be provided to all CIPAD staff to enhance their knowledge and skills in protection issues, ensuring that they are prepared to address emerging risks and respond to the diverse needs of affected populations. Key training initiatives include:

**Comprehensive Protection Training:** All staff, from program managers to field staff, will receive training on core protection issues, including child protection, gender-based violence (GBV), and sexual exploitation and abuse (SEA) prevention. This will ensure a deep understanding of protection risks, policies, and ethical standards.
